Membership: Preserving Templary for the Future

I am an historian and devote much of my efforts to preserving the legacy of Templary for the future. One might be surprised to know that preserving that legacy is directly related to membership, for if we do not grow and prosper, we will join the graveyard of fraternal societies. When I was preparing the second edition of my volume on Oklahoma Templar history, I looked at membership to identify what was happening, and what I found was alarming. In the period from 2013 to 2018, a total of 344 men joined Templary in Oklahoma, but 173 left by suspension or withdrawal. In a 2011 article from *The Boston Phoenix*, Ian Adams of Amicable Lodge in Cambridge noted:

A lot of people become involved in music because they're looking for something higher — or to get girls, which is something higher.

Young men come to Freemasonry for a unique, spiritual, experience they cannot find anywhere else. The men coming to Templary in specific are no different in what they too are pursuing. It is for this reason that Templary must provide a quality experience to attract and maintain members. The Traditional Observance movement in Freemasonry recognizes this desire for unique experiences; Oklahoma Templary could easily build upon that with quality programs for Sir Knights.

For those Sir Knights who bring new men into Templary, the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the U.S.A. has a special membership jewel for being the first line signer for a total of ten petitioners. The jewel was created in 1991 and oak leaf clusters are awarded for each additional set of 5 petitioners signed for. The jewel is an excellent way to show one's

commitment to the future of Templary, but I want to issue a challenge to every Sir Knight who signs a candidate's petition for Chivalric Masonry. Do not simply bring men into Templary and consider your work done. Do something to create those unique, spiritual, and quality experiences these men are looking for. This is what will ensure the future of the order and create involved and invested Sir Knights.
