WINTER MEETING

The meeting starts at 1:00 PM EST and is scheduled to end around 4:00 PM EST. The Winter Meeting is meant to inform Commanderies of the activities of the Grand Commandery up to this point, how Commanderies within each Battalion are faring as compared to other Commanderies in their Battalion and the state, and provide overall general information to all Sir Knights. I encourage each of you to consider attending. There is no registration cost or fee to attend. Preferred attire for the meeting is slacks and shirt (business casual).

NEWBY-AVERY-VAUGHT DINNER

The Newby-Avery-Vaught dinner will also be Saturday, January 21st at The Seasons. Social hour starts at 5:00 PM EST, with dinner at 6:00 PM. Attire for this event is Commandery uniform (no chapeau or sword) or tuxedo, and cocktail dress or formal for ladies.

What is the Newby-Avery-Vaught (NAV) dinner, and why would you want to attend?

First and foremost, this dinner gives all Sir Knights an opportunity to honor three great men from Indiana who have served as Grand Master of the Grand Encampment: Willard Avery, Leonidas Newby, and Duane Vaught.

The Newby-Avery-Vaught (NAV) dinner raises funds for Indiana Grand Commandery. These funds allow us to operate <u>without having to increase the per capita that Commanderies pay to Indiana Grand Commandery</u>. The per capita paid to Grand Commandery has remained stable for many years due to this dinner, and we hope that the Sir Knights and Commanderies of Indiana will continue to support NAV.

The funds raised at this dinner allow us to not charge a registration fee for events such as Annual Conclave, the Winter Meeting, and the Indiana Templar Academies.

The Newby-Avery-Vaught dinner gives all Sir Knights and their ladies an opportunity to enjoy fellowship and camaraderie and exchange thoughts and ideas in a more relaxed manner than may occur at the Annual Conclave.

What is the cost of the Newby-Avery-Vaught dinner? Each Commandery can purchase a Chair for \$250 and will receive a plaque identifying the Commandery as a Newby-Avery-Vaught Chair. One member

(typically the current Eminent Commander) may attend the NAV dinner for five years at no additional charge after purchasing a Chair.

Any Sir Knight can become a Newby-Avery-Fellow for \$250. Fellows are given a Newby-Avery-Vaught pin with one jewel chip, and additional chips are added each year that another Fellow is purchased. NAV Fellows are invited to attend the dinner at no additional charge for themselves.

Any Sir Knight and their Lady can attend the Newby-Avery-Vaught dinner at a cost of \$45 each. If you are not sure what NAV is all about, I encourage you to come to the dinner to learn more and to enjoy the fellowship and camaraderie.
