Fifty years ago this month, in December of 1972 the crew of Apollo 17 was conducting NASA's last crewed mission to the moon. Command Module Pilot Ron Evans orbited the moon in the Command Module "America" while Commander Gene Cernan and Harrison "Jack" Schmitt had taken the Lunar Module "Challenger" to the lunar surface.

On Dec 11th, 1972, Mission Commander Cernan and Lunar Module Pilot Schmitt were in the initial stages of their first EVA (Moonwalk).
